**Objectives:** To examine the impact of Acquisitions on financial status of selected software companies in India. This study is based on Infosys, Panaya, CMC and TCS companies.

Methods:It also estimates the pre and post-acquisition financial position of companies using financial parameters like Earning per share, Dividend per share, Return on Assets and Net Profit Margin. The period of study is for 6 years which is divided into 3 years for pre-acquisition and 3 years for post-acquisition performance. The data of Acquisitions has collected based on the financial parameters, Paired T-test has used for finding the statistical significance effect and to estimate their performance on merged companies.

**Result:** As the critical value is greater than the calculated value i.e. -2.919>-6.679, Rejected the Null hypothesis, i.e. there is a major difference between performance of pre and post-merger as per earning per share. As the calculated value is greater than critical value i.e. 3.64 >2.919, Accepted the Null hypothesis, i.e. there is no major difference in the Earning per Share.

Conclusion: The terminal goal behind acquisition is to achieve growth in business. A well-analysed and the authentic plan will dramatically improve the chances of getting new implements to be in a competitive world.
